• MOBILE CLINICS

The Evangelical Church in Akkaka, a small village next to Minia - Upper Egypt, serves more than a thousand members men, women and children of all ages. Our team has recently noticed the absence of any kind of medical services, hospitals or even clinics there. So, they decided to advertise the campaign and evaluate the outcome. On the determined day, 90 children between the ages of 3 and 5 were seen by the team, making that trial trip very successful.



The evaluation shows that the number of the respiratory tract illnesses is on the rise caused by the children's low immunity and that almost 50% of the children are anemic. The most shocking finding was the mothers' low awareness of the common winter diseases as well as ignorance concerning the basic standards of infection prevention. But the most alarming, was the frequent misuse of antibiotics.

Considering the good outcome and seeing the huge need for any medical services in the area, HOME decided to hold around 20 trips for the mobile clinic in 2018. Our prayers are that the Lord will provide enough funds and the right dedicated medical staff for all that to be possible. *"almost 50% of the children are anemic"*

• HOPE CLINIC & AUTISM CENTER IN CAIRO

HOME Autism Center was inaugurated on October 1st, 2017. This specialty clinic is located on the premises of the Evangelical Church-Nasr City in Cairo, Egypt. It is never easy to handle a child who is constantly crying. It is even more difficult to take care of a child who is unresponsive to her mother's tender love and never answers when called by name. That is the story of 4-year old Maryam from Egypt. Her mother, alarmed by her only daughter's behavior, took her to countless doctors to no avail, and fears were dismissed as those of a simple paranoid mother. The child was eventually diagnosed with epilepsy and given treatment, but the mother had heard about autism and had suspected her daughter might be



somewhere on the spectrum. As soon as she had the chance, she took Maryam to an Autism specialist. The diagnosis was official; Maryam was autistic.

Three months ago, the parents heard about HOME Family Center in Cairo. The child was taken in, no payment required, and the long journey began. Shortly after, signs of change began to appear in

Maryam's behavior. She became more responsive to her surroundings and to the people around her. And to the joy of her parents, she spoke her first words!

• SCHOOL OF MEDICAL MISSIONS

We have been blessed in Egypt with the launch of the Medical Missionary School since 2011. Enrollment in this program requires a 6 months commitment. But despite the enthusiasm of many, it was impossible for all to join as that would require them to be away from their families for the whole period of the program. Consequently, we decided to run the program in different provinces starting in Assyout and then Elmenia. Soon, the same program will be launched in Beni Sweif (160 Km South of Cairo).

NURSING TRAINING PROGRAMS

HOME in Egypt planned 2 Nurse Assistant training programs for Nurse aids who already



work in medical institutions, hospitals, clinics, etc. The first training took place for 12 nurse

aids.

With the generous support of MBF, HOME decided to sponsor eight candidates to complete their Bachelor's & Masters degrees in Nursing and Nursing Education at private universities in Egypt. The aim of this program is to select candidates who are committed to the Lord and who are willing to serve at



candidates are yet to join in the next months. The students have been following additional



training sessions at the HOME clinic in Nasr City, led and supervised by Dr. Doreen, a Christian Physician at the clinic, and Dr Liliane Iskander, PHD in Nursing. The training topics include, Infection Control, latrogenic Disease, Nosocomial Infection, blood transmitted Infections, Intensive Care ICU Nursing, CPR, and others. The nursing students participated also in Nursing Training for the Sudanese refugee population in Cairo. In addition, the students joined the mobile clinic visits in Cairo and other remote areas in north and south of Cairo. An average of 3-4 clinics is required by each student.

IRAQ Reaching the displaced families

• NORTHERN IRAQ: KURDISTAN



The HOME mobile clinic in Erbil is serving now in Hersham Kamp which shelters about a thousand families. Our team was recently granted permission by the Ministry of Health to work at the camp, making it possible to serve around 100 patients every Thursday, with the hope of increasing that number soon.

Those displaced Arab, Kurdish and Yazidi families coming from Sinjar City, Mosul and other

war-torn cities live in dreadful situations. The lack of financial means, and the long distance to the nearest hospitals make it even harder for the patients to have access to any medical care. HOME is filling the gap by bringing the mobile clinic on site with our faithful and dedicated internist, pediatrician, dentist, pharmacist and microbiologist on board. Medications and some biochemical, hematological and serological tests are

offered too.

But most of all, our team brings an example of God's unconditional love to the afflicted who have lost loved ones and everything dear to them, and shares the Cure provided by the Great Physician with those who have lost their faith in humanity after all they have witnessed.

• GRACE CLINIC IN BAGHDAD, IRAQ

The Lord has blessed the clinic and all its staff with wonderful opportunities for ministry this year. Naturally we wanted to end the year on a high note as well and what better way than to celebrate Christmas with the clinic patients, especially those who have consistently been coming for a long time, and with whom special bonds of trust and friendship have been built over the years.

Invitations were sent to the children and their parents who are served through the stationary and mobile clinics. The celebration started with a Christmas message from brother Muthaffar. Then, Santa made his appearance! The children couldn't contain their joy! Om Ahmad, a clinic patient and friend since 2005, traveled about 19 miles from the other side of Baghdad to bring her children. She cried and later said that she had never seen her children this happy in



their lives!

Unfortunately, some of the children originally invited were hospitalized at the time of the celebration, so Dr. Muhammad, the hospital manager, had the Grace clinic staff come visit them where they were along with Santa Claus to lift their spirits! The Lord also showed up in unexpected ways that evening. Many parents asked for prayers of healing for their sons and daughters. One of the children who had been under anesthesia, but was never able to wake up, opened his eyes that night bringing joy to his mother and praises to the Lord from all who were there.

And below is the latest report by our Field Director in Baghdad, Iraq: "The situation in Baghdad is now stable but there is still a constant fear of acts of terrorism and kidnappings. But in all circumstances, we thank the Lord that all is well at Grace clinic and the mobile clinic. We treated many patients last month. On the 16th of October, as the mobile clinic was visiting Al Rasheed refugee camp, Dr. Hany, one of our volunteers, suspected that a young patient was infected with the plague. He quickly called his friend, another physician, and had a special medical team survey the entire camp. Fortunately, there was no infection, but our efforts did not go unnoticed, as the Mayor thanked us and the pastor of the church. He also offered to provide our guards some firearms for further protection, but we graciously refused, explaining that we put our trust in the Lord. The Mayor also explained how grateful he was to the Christians in the area and their willingness to serve and care for the people in the country.

Om Zhraa, a patient at the clinic, is a refugee struggling to raise and cope with an Autistic child. She has had difficulty finding doctors that would be willing to treat him.

We found her in tears at the front door of the clinic with her child, begging for help. She had been referred to the clinic by her neighbor who had explained that Christians were always willing to help. them, and provided the necessary medical attention by the skilled Dr. Ghada. The mother, having faced tremendous difficulty with her son and a husband who had abandoned the family, was overwhelmed with gratitude and asked to repay us by cleaning the clinic for a month with her daughters. She even brought in some home cooked meals! But most importantly, she inquired about becoming a Christian herself. After the initial visit, the mother



came back to the clinic multiple times and now attends Sunday School and the church service with her children. And for that, we are eternally grateful.

Jaffar Ali is one of Grace clinic's patients. He is a Christian of Muslim background and is currently receiving Discipleship lessons. Jaffar had been suffering with diabetes for months and came to the clinic seeking help. The clinic provided the medication he needed and our very own Dr. Wissam often accompanied him to the hospital.

His doctors had decided to amputate both his legs due to the side effects, but with the second opinion of our doctors, we were able to come to the decision to only amputate one of them from the ankle down instead and settle for minor operation on the second one.

Grace clinic later gave Jaffar a wheelchair as a gift, and so had the opportunity to visit him at his home in a Shiite area. He was ever so grateful, praised the Lord for saving his leg, and accepting him as a son. And we are so very grateful for his testimony! We always receive calls from refugees with medical problems and emergencies at the camp. One afternoon, we received a call about a poisoning case due to contaminated water, and we went to the camp to help. The locals were so thankful.



Sumaia, a young mother who lost her husband in the war, visited our clinic last month with breast cancer. She has no family and our doctors were able to encourage her as her family in Christ. We arranged for her to visit the Radiology and Atomic Medicine Hospital in Baghdad three times. The doctors, after hearing that we were a Christian clinic serving the refugees, promised to operate on her that same week and help her through Chemical treatment. We pray for the Lord's healing hand over her.



Please keep on praying for the Lord's protection over all the staff from infectious diseases and that the Lord may protect Iraq amid the civil war between the North and Baghdad."





JORDAN Hope and healing for the hopeless

BEACON OF HOPE AT ANNOR SANITORIUM

HOME's partners in ministry, Dr H. and his team, have been serving Tuberculosis patients in Jordan for many years. Around 20,000 patients from Jordan and the neighboring countries are offered treatment for Multiple Drug Resistant Pulmonary Tuberculosis each year.

MERCY CLINIC IN ZARKA JORDAN

The clinic at Zarqa has seen tremendous growth over the past year and the number of lives

touched by that ministry is on the rise. Ghada is a Syrian refugee. Widowed and a mother of two, she decided to seek refuge in a UN camp in Jordan in 2012. But the biggest tragedy



they faced was the loss of the oldest son due to heart problems. She was left with her other son who also suffers from heart disease and was in need for a stent which costs around \$6000.

Recently, having moved to Zarqa, the mother approached HOME's partners at Mercy Clinic for help. The clinic's team visited the home to assess the situation and provided her with financial support to cover rent for 4 months. She was very touched by the love the

Prior to the HOME Conference, the people attending the conference had the opportunity to spend four days at the Elpis, Fanar and HOME mobile clinic.





It has been encouraging to witness the churches in

Lebanon as they embrace the opportunity God has provided them with and rise up to share the love of Christ with millions of refugees that He has brought to their doorstep.

HOME ELPIS CLINIC IN BEIRUT

The HOME ELPIS Clinic serves an average of 350 patients per month with a variety of nationalities as there are many refugees from the nearby suffering countries. HOME's Medical Services Expansion Project in Lebanon consists of purchasing a new larger clinic in Beirut, Lebanon to replace the one it has been leasing over the last 5 years, and equip it with new medical, dental and Ophthalmology equipment. This



new clinic will target the underserved Lebanese communities who cannot afford quality treatment elsewhere. Besides, HOME Lebanon will continue to target refugees living in Lebanon. Through the establishment of this new clinic in Lebanon, the service expansion will allow HOME to serve around 30% additional patients per year in Lebanon, at least 60% of whom will be Lebanese.

• OPERATING ROOM

The third of an estimated seven containers has arrived to continue the progress of the

"...desperately needed medical materials..." building structure for the operating room suite addition to the Hospital. Samaritan's Purse continues to generously provide the containers and shipping costs, while individual supporters continue to sacrificially give to purchase the materials needed to fill the containers. A team of 8 men from North America spent the last month with us to put up the remaining interior wall frames, run the electricity, start on the insulation, create the septic tank, and lay the first part of the floor. They

then returned home to wait for the next container to be filled and shipped to further the work on the building, including putting up interior walls and doors, installing the HVAC system, and outfitting the entire building with solar energy. In the meantime, there is a team of people in the United States working on finding and purchasing the medical materials we will need, once the building is finished. They have even started shipping desperately needed medical materials in this last container, namely a new operating room table! This project continues to move forward to the glory of God. Please continue to pray for wisdom and strength for those involved in planning and carrying out these plans and pray that the remaining funding that



needs to be in place, especially for the solar energy and medical equipment, would come about.



MOBILE CLINIC IN MAURITANIA

After much planning and waiting, the new HOME Mobile Clinic Vehicle is finally here!

Due to the remote nature of many of the villages we visit, and the rough terrain to travel there, we decided to purchase a Toyota Landcruiser Pickup as the ideal Mobile Clinic Vehicle for our

setting. This will allow us to transport people, personal items (as we camp out in the desert when we go on these visits), and



medical supplies. Now that the vehicle is in country, our next step is to outfit it with a specially designed cap that has spaces to store the medical supplies. "Please continue to pray that we would be salt and light to these far away forgotten places as we bring compassionate medical care to their villages."

We have been still going out on our mobile clinic visits, even while waiting for the vehicle to arrive. The last trip we took involved two visiting doctors, a nurse, and their families...even the children got involved!

SOUTH SUDAN Shining the light and sharing the love



According to the Associated Press, South Sudan's civil war has caused nearly 400,000 deaths since the war started in 2013. Most of these deaths are caused mainly by violence but also by the increased risk of diseases and the reduced access to health care.

HOME has been deeply involved in lending a hand in this immense need of medical services since 2012 through its Good Shepperd Clinic in Juba Town. The twenty-three staff members include a medical doctor, 2 medical assistants, 2 midwives, 6 nurses, 7 lab technicians, 3 custodians, a watchman and a driver.

The clinic serves a population of around 17,000 people. Around 85 patients are seen every

"Around 85 patients are seen every day" day for consultations, vaccinations, minor surgeries, lab and nutrition among other services. The clinic has earned a respectable reputation not only for providing good medical services but also for shining the Light and sharing the Love of the Ultimate Healer. However, the Good Shepherd Clinic services are not limited to its location only but extended to the

patients who cannot come through the mobile clinic. Fifteen trips were taken this year to reach out to the suffering people with The Cure!

With the support of a very generous American HOME donor, the clinic was able to drill a water well to serve some population just outside Juba. The water was tested and deemed good for drinking to the delight of the community.

Please keep praying for the team, as they struggle with some continuous challenges; shortage of medicine, fuel and water. The clinic needs testing machines for the lab and a good transportation means for medications during the mobile clinic and above all, protection for every member, as South Sudan is still one of the most dangerous places in the world to be in.

SYRIA Healing wounds of war

Over the last two decades, the Tabaleh clinic in Damascus, Syria has become a healing house of refuge to tens of thousands of displaced people from Iraq and other parts of Syria. High quality compassionate care is offered in the name of the Great Physician addressing a great medical and spiritual need. With more than 0.5 Million people dead





and more than 13 Million people inside Syria desperately requiring humanitarian assistance, the work in the Tabbaleh Clinic continues to be sustained by the Grace of God and

supported by HOME as we see the great impact of this polyclinic in alleviating the suffering. The clinic

welcomes daily a huge number of patients from the different suburbs of Damascus. It offers treatments in diverse specialties namely, pulmonology, pediatrics, orthopedics, internal

medicine, gynecology, dentistry, physiotherapy and X-Ray. All these services and medications are offered for very small fees if not gratis. An average of 1,500 patients of all ages are seen per month.

In 2018, the clinic in Tabbaleh received an additional support from HOME specifically to upgrade the

laboratory which serves more than 600 patients per month. An adjacent room to the lab has been added, a new blood analyzer machine and a digital X-Ray image processor were purchased. That drastically improved the medical performance in the clinic.

WEST BANK Giving the gift of clear vision

• PUBLIC HEALTH AWARENESS & EYE GLASSES

HOME is privileged to be able to support and serve through the **"Hand of Love"** organization in the West Bank for several years now. Medical relief work in the West Bank and Gaza is always facing challenges as the situation has never been stabilized.



Since the beginning of 2018, our staff has trained 115 mothers in First Aid and public health awareness in six new villages that we visited. All the attendees received First Aid kits gifts with the HOME logo on them. Around 400 children were reached in five

new schools. They learned spiritual songs and how to maintain a healthy body and oral

hygiene. All these children also received toothbrushes.

We were also able to offer ophthalmology examinations for several patients providing 120 of them with corrective glasses.

Yet, the dear people need much more than

love and care from fellow humans, who see their

social, spiritual and emotional struggles as well. All of them live in an uncertain world where inequality, injustice, violence and depravity prevail. Our purpose is to share the Love along with the cure. We visit their houses offering counsel and teaching with genuine compassion as they ask profound compassion questions.

YEMEN Reaching out with health awareness and cholera prevention

Over the last three years the ongoing devastating civil war in Yemen has highly



impacted the basic public health sanitation infrastructure of the country resulting in a major Cholera outbreak which was first reported in 2016 whereby the suspected cases exceeded on million individuals in 2018. This phenomenal increase reported by the WHO

and the Yemen Ministry of Public Health makes this cholera outbreak the largest epidemic in the world!

Vital public health infrastructures in

civilian areas have been destroyed or made inoperable resulting in massive displacement of the affected population into crowded "this cholera outbreak is the largest epidemic in the world!"



and insanitary conditions. Currently many thousand attributable deaths have been reported and the outbreak has extended geographically, affecting nearly all the governorates in the country. These findings were reported by the HOME leadership in the August 2018, Issue of a leading Infection Control journal (Infection Control & Hospital Epidemiology) with an Infection Prevention plan to these devastating outbreaks

occurring in Yemen, Iraq and Syria.

Simultaneously, HOME reached within Yemen by collaborating with dear brothers on a health awareness and Cholera prevention campaign in the beloved Yemen where children and civilians have been the leading victims of Cholera, Diphtheria and other war related emerging diseases.

Furthermore, children in Yemen suffered tremendously from insecurity and psychological trauma whereby many of

them have lost adult family members due to the devastating civil war.

Therefore, HOME helped establish programs that focused on prevention and treatment of Cholera, Diphtheria, and Dengue Fever with a massive campaign involving hygiene kit distributions. The goal of this Health Awareness campaign was to serve



the marginalized groups and share the love of God through these programs.



Over the last few years, HOME has been blessed to see how the Lord has been moving our ministry in exciting new directions, allowing us to reach more needy people in different parts of the world. To further the Kingdom of God, we ask that you join your hearts to ours and join hands with us as partners with HOME in accomplishing what the Lord has burdened us to do through these various projects.
